Karansi—A Village That READS by Brian Halpin

Readers of this journal are already aware of the transformation that continues to take place in Karansi, both inside the schoolyard walls and in the village at large. We are excited to announce a new initiative to expand and accelerate that transformation. With the full support of the local District government, the Tanzania country team has partnered with our friends at PUNCHWMI to begin the process of establishing a village library that will enhance the lives of not only the PUNCHWMI primary school students, but also students of surrounding schools and village residents.



The vision is simple – a centrally-located library will provide books and other educational resources to the staff and students of local schools, for use in the classroom environment. Additionally, students and villagers alike will be able to view books on the library



premise at their leisure. We are also engaging community figures, including local government and education leaders, to sponsor reading events and contests, so that the library becomes a community gathering place. Through these efforts, we hope to see the village embrace reading as a means of improving the overall quality of life in Karansi, and furthering the growing perception of Karansi as an emerging education center.

As of press time, construction and furnishing of the library facility is near completion, and plans are underway to collect and transport an initial inventory of books to Tanzania during the early part of 2018. This is a multi-tiered project whereby we are partnering with established non-profit organizations that specialize in providing books to African countries, as well as leading outreach to

select publishers of books that we are targeting as ideal resources to enable the educational goals of the PUNCHWMI primary school.

I'm sure many of you are asking, "How can I help this effort?" There are several opportunities to support the Library project. We are currently seeking volunteers to help our teaching team finalize a list of targeted titles and resources, and to begin an outreach campaign to the publishers of those works. We will



also be seeking volunteers in the coming months to help us sort and prepare items for shipment from a local warehouse location to Tanzania. 

al is counter to the culture in Africa. In God's grace and power the material was well received and plans for deeper training are being laid. The Headmaster said it well, "I am proud we are a Christian school where we can teach abstinence- a word many here have never heard."

The school is starting with the youngest students and teaching that human sexuality is a lot more than just the physical. All people are physical, intellectual, emotional, social and spiritual beings. PUNCHMI school has now begun the incredible journey of teaching young people how to nurture,

how to care for, and how to grow all parts of who they are, human beings created in God's image. All God's people, pouring our lives into one another, no matter where we live. God is good, all the time! All the time God is good!
